

Re-opening the church building for worship

I'm pleased to say that in line with Church of England guidance we are now preparing to re-open the church building for public worship, beginning with a simple service of Morning Prayer on Sunday 6th September at 10am as usual. As this will be our first service since March and we have detailed guidance to follow, no doubt there will be a few hiccups, so please bear with us!

Unfortunately, in order to maintain social distancing, we have to limit the number of people who can attend each service; our current calculation is that we can seat 40 individuals, small households or 'bubbles' safely at any one time. In order to manage cleaning after the service we are not opening the toilets at the moment, but we will review this for the future.

If you would like to attend on 6th please do phone the parish office (270 2705) and leave a message which includes the names of any other people who will sit with you because you are in the same household or bubble.

Please be aware of these other changes:

- when you arrive you may have to queue for a while please maintain a distance of 2m from others;
- please wear a face covering as you queue and all the time you are in the church - we have some extras for those who cannot obtain their own;
- you will be welcomed, asked to sanitise your hands, given a service sheet and directed to a seat - please sit only in this place as we need to maintain distances and reduce movement;
- during the service we are not able to sing but there will be music and hymns to listen to;
- after the service please keep your distance from others as you leave and do not linger in the building - sadly we can't offer refreshments;
- please take your service sheet home with you;

- you will be asked to sanitise your hands as you leave;
- when we have all gone the church building will remain unused for 72 hours to eliminate any virus.;
- if you should feel unwell with any of the symptoms of coronavirus in the two weeks following the service, as well as seeking medical advice, please leave a message at the Parish Office so that we can inform others if need be.

I know that these requirements will make the service feel unusual and may indeed put you off, but please remember that God himself is not shaped by our circumstances! The world is an imperfect place and we are imperfect people but we can worship God in all situations and he is pleased when we do. This is our first step on the road towards a 'normal' worshipping life together and we should try to feel some joy as well as a healthy awareness of all that we have to do to be safe.

Some other important dates:

- the Parish Centre re-opens from 8th September, with Mark and Steph back to take care of it for us;
- James, our Parish Administrator, will return from furlough on 1st
 September, but the Office, sadly, cannot open to personal callers;
- the church building will be open for a service of Holy Communion on Sundays 13th, 20th and 27th September, at 10am.;
- following his ordination as priest in the Cathedral on Sunday 13th September, Matthew will preside at a service of Holy Communion at St Mary's on Wednesday 16th September at 7.30pm;
- on Sunday 4th October we will celebrate our Harvest Festival (somehow!) and then have our Annual Church Meeting (postponed from April and looking back at 2019).

Meanwhile we will continue to produce our Virtual Worship each week and of course the Newsletter will be emailed or posted out to everyone for whom we have contact details and permission.

Listening to God's Word

Our Bible readings for Sunday, 30th August are: Jeremiah 15.15-21 and **Matthew 16.21-end**

Jesus Predicts His Death

- ²¹ From that time on Jesus began to explain to his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things at the hands of the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and on the third day be raised to life.
- ²² Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. "Never, Lord!" he said. "This shall never happen to you!"
- ²³ Jesus turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; you do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."
- ²⁴ Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵ For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it. ²⁶ What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? ²⁷ For the Son of Man is going to come in his Father's glory with his angels, and then he will reward each person according to what they have done.
- ²⁸ "Truly I tell you, some who are standing here will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom."

Reflection by the Revd Janet Gasper

We find Jesus at a crossroads in this gospel reading – from that time on he began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer and die at the hands of the religious leaders and on the third day be raised. Peter has recognized Jesus as the Messiah and Peter pictures a figure of Glory and only hears Jesus words about suffering. But Jesus knows he must suffer and die and he is willing to make that choice and to start preparing his disciples for this.

For Jesus this means continuing in the same loving direction as before. Peter is appalled that the Son of the Living God could suffer – he can't accept it and tells this to Jesus and Jesus has to help Peter make a 'U Turn'. Jesus words to Peter sound brutal: "Get behind me Satan. You are a stumbling block to me." All those listening, and that includes us, are shocked, but here is revealed the strengths and weaknesses that make Peter's humanity a model for all who try to follow and often feel they have failed. A little earlier Jesus had hailed Peter as 'the rock' on whom he will build his church. That the same rock should also be a stumbling block reminds us that Peter did not come fully formed but had to learn to exercise his vocation through a series of errors and misconceptions. The stumbling block must be put behind Jesus but those who want to become his followers must also get behind him.

Jesus assures the disciples that those who take up the cross and follow will find their lives. This is 'a path of revelation' and 'becoming' in which they will discover new selves formed in the likeness of Christ. On the cross we see God in Jesus stretching out his arms to embrace the suffering of the world, choosing the costly way of love and service rather than the way of power and greed.

Next Tuesday the church commemorates Giles of Provence. In the 7th Century he set up a monastery in Provence on the pilgrimage route to the Holy Land. He cared for the wounded, the exhausted, those crippled by disease, happy even to take in lepers who were not permitted to enter towns. There was no respite and Giles never turned anyone away.

Today we see this costly way of love and service taught by Jesus in those who work for aid agencies: Christian Aid, Red Cross, UNICEF, Save the Children, Doctors serving with Medicin Sans Frontiers and emergency workers throughout the world. Our hearts go out to those trying to relieve the plight of those in Beirut who have lost everything in the explosion. We see edited highlights on our TV screen – they know the heart-breaking decisions that have to be made on the ground.

Thank God that people are called to help in the extremities of life in this world and ask God to help us take the costly way of love and service in the way we care for family, friend and stranger.

How do we live as the Church now? Worship

"Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved. " (Acts 2.46-47)

Over the summer weeks I've been reflecting on each of the 'holy habits', or characteristics, of the life of the early church, as shown to us by Luke in the Acts of the Apostles. The ninth 'holy habit' is worship, 'praising God' – which the Bible consistently presents to us as the intentional act of laying out our appreciation of God's character and actions, which in turn arises from a loving and faithful heart. Worship is therefore something that we decide to do, but it is rooted in our experience of faith and God's goodness in our own lives.

There are times when worship feels easy and the natural thing to do when we have such a sense of deep joy and gratitude that we cannot help but worship God. But there are also times when the last thing we feel like doing is worshipping God. Perhaps our circumstances or worries are weighing us down, or perhaps illness and death seem ever present; at such times we need each other and the encouragement of worshipping together to sustain us.

In the current pandemic we remain Christians who want to worship together, even while we are forced to remain apart. Though our buildings are once again beginning to open, tentatively, our meetings will not look like our traditional worship for some considerable time to come. How then do we put into practice this 'holy habit' in a corona virus world?

The first Christians certainly met together to worship God, as Luke tells

us, but it's also clear that their faith spilled over into all aspects of life. They discovered that all of life can be worship when lived for love of God. Worship is not just confined to an hour or two in church but we ought to offer it often, as a grateful response to God who is involved in all aspects of our lives; our work, rest, enjoyment of creation, service, eating, giving ... and meeting.

The current restrictions are perhaps a chance to learn some new things about worship, and even to learn some new *ways* to worship. Those of us who have access to the internet can find a whole range of different styles of worship in church to view or be part of, for example. There are many very good modern songs to help us worship – they are certainly not traditional hymns but nevertheless can bring us into the presence of God for worship in a fresh way that can invigorate our faith.

For all of us, this is a chance to *choose* to worship rather than just acting automatically because we're in church. Perhaps we're being called to make more of an *effort* and to put together some words of praise and thanksgiving ourselves? And certainly we have the opportunity to praise God through the day for every aspect of life – perhaps we could just pause after every routine task and simply say "Praise God from whom all blessings flow".

In the meantime, keep safe and stay well.

Dad had requested no flowers, however he was heartily involved with Menphys for over 50 years therefore donations, if so wished, can be made on the just giving page;


